Mens verden hastigt forandrer sig, trækker samtiden sig sammen. Der er en fornemmelse af, at fremtiden med øget hast undergraver nutiden, imens nutiden i lige så høj hast fortaber sig i fortiden.

I dette scenarie står samtidens kunstnere og dokumentarister over for en ny udfordring. Alle, der traditionelt har afbildet verden, må forholde sig til denne opgave, alt imens verden og vor viden om den konstant udvikler sig. Udstillingens kunstnere beskæftiger sig på forskellig vis med denne udfordring. I stedet for at zoome ind på og holde tæt med tiden, er der nu tendens til at zoome ud. Kunst og film bliver stadig mindre ‘kontemporær’, dvs. *med* tiden, og i stigende grad ‘ekstemporær’, dvs. *ude af* tiden.

Nutiden begribes ikke som et øjeblik, men som del af en større tidslighed fra menneskets over naturens til universets historie. ‘De store fortællingers fald’ giver nu plads til endnu større, svimlende fortællinger, der ikke holder sig til en enkel, lineær tidslinje. Denne udstilling fokuserer ikke på verdens aktuelle tilstand, men de retninger som verden bevæger sig i.
